

PharmedOut Annual Report 2010

Thanks to our generous donors and devoted volunteers, PharmedOut continues to grow and thrive! In 2010, PharmedOut:

- Convened a high-profile conference, Prescription for Conflict: Should Industry Fund Physician Education? Our illustrious speakers included Carl Elliott, author of White Coat, Black Hat, Dan Carlat, author of Unhinged, Josh Sharfstein, Deputy Commissioner of the FDA, and Paul Thacker, a Senior Investigator for Senator Grassley. The June conference was covered by the New York Times and JAMA, and attracted 130 clinicians, lawyers, policymakers, ethicists, industry representatives and students. - Published two peer-reviewed articles:
 - Haunting the Medical Literature: How Ghostwriting was Used to Sell Menopausal Hormone Therapy, published in <u>PLoS Medicine</u>, was covered in Nature, Scientific American, and many other publications, and has been viewed more than 19,000 times.
 - Why lunch matters: assessing physicians' perceptions about industry relationships was published in the <u>Journal of Continuing Education in the Health</u> <u>Professions</u>. This article analyzes the effect of our Grand Rounds presentation, the first to demonstrate change in physician perceptions of their individual susceptibility to industry influence.
- Released Why Lunch Matters, our sophisticated Grand Rounds presentation, on our website, in order to disseminate this proven intervention as widely as possible.
- Testified to the FDA Reproductive Health Drugs Advisory Committee in June about how CME was used to prepare the market for flibanserin, a failed antidepressant recast as a cure for the invented condition "hypoactive sexual desire disorder". The advisory committee voted not to approve the drug.
- Provided Grand Rounds in psychiatry at Rosalind Franklin University of Medicine and Sciences and internal medicine at Virginia Commonwealth University; lectures to medical students at Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences and George Washington University School of Medicine; an ethics presentation to the Baltimore County Medical Association and Maryland Psychiatric Society, and a presentation to an international symposium in Toronto on the regulation of pharmaceutical promotion.
- Completed the analysis of our national survey regarding interactions of trainees with pharmaceutical representatives in U.S. family medicine residencies. Our paper is in press at Academic Medicine.

- Continued to provide free web-based continuing medical education modules, including our popular interactive course, "The Pharmalyzer: Are you prescribing under the influence?" and other important resources through our <u>website</u>. Thousands of physicians and educators downloaded our <u>CME courses</u> on Generic Drugs, Drug Approval in the U.S., and The Pharmalyzer, our <u>slideshows</u>, and many other resources.
- Served as an important resource for policymakers and national <u>media</u>. A list of media coverage follows.
